

How to Choose a College Major

Group Discussion: "Major Match"

Lesson Objective: To help students understand the diverse career options available for various college majors and to encourage flexibility in career choices.

Introduction: Begin the session by explaining to the students that they will explore various career possibilities associated with different college majors. Emphasize the importance of understanding that the choice of a major does not limit their career options in the future.

Instructions: The facilitator or teacher should present a college major from the list (e.g., Biology) and ask students to propose careers related to that major.

- 1. Go around the room, allowing each student to suggest a career associated with each major presented.
- 2. Encourage students to provide brief explanations for their choices.
- Facilitator may interject to ask students for more details or to explain the relevance of their career choice to the major.
- 4. Repeat the process for 3-4 different college majors from the list.

Discussion: After the Major Match activity, gather the students for a discussion.

- Ask the students if they were surprised by any of the career options associated with the different majors.
- Emphasize that while certain majors may provide a more direct path to specific careers, their major does not define their entire future.
- Explain that life is filled with opportunities for learning, growth, and change, even after college or retirement.

Conclusion: Summarize the key takeaways:

- Choosing a major is an important step, but it doesn't limit one's career possibilities.
- Flexibility and adaptability are crucial in the ever-changing job market.
- Encourage students to explore their interests and passions rather than feel locked into a specific major or career path.
- Education is a lifelong journey with room for new interests and pursuits at every stage of life.
